BLUFFTON—Dr. Howard Raid, Ind., and Flint, Mich., were reported. At Flint, Mich., 1,000-man days of work were donated.

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Blaze Basis Of Area Suit

VAN WERT—A fire that razed the Bar 30 and Steak House on West Main St. last April 30, is the basis of \$3,880.94 damage suit filed in the Van Wert Court of Common Pleas by Richard M. Richard, owner, the Central Mutual Insurance Co. and the American Insurance Co.

The action is against Grace Morris, operator of the service station adjacent to the destroyed buildings, E. Palmer Morris, an employe of the station and The Gulf Refining Co. of Toledo.

The petition charges that three storage tanks owned by the refining company were not inspected and allowed to leak, and that Palmer Morris allegedly failed to observe and control pumping operations from the truck to the tanks and as a result permitted inflammable liquid to overflow and seep into the basement of the buildings.

Because of the seepage, the liquid was ignited by a pilot light of a gas furnace, resulting in an explosion and fire. The plaintiffs charge the defendants with negligence.

ASCS Head Cites Grain Loan Deadline

WAPAKONETA—Farmers have been reminded there are only a few weeks before the deadline for taking out Commodity Credit Corp. loans or purchase agreements for most of the major grains and for some other important crops.

Wilson R. Arnett, chairman of the Auglaize county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, advised that Jan. 31 is the final date for approving loans and purchase agreements for the eligible 1956 crops. However, applications must be in before this date to allow time to complete the necessary inspections and other details. Applications should be filed at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office, 11 Willepie St., Wapakoneta on or before Friday.

Crops to which the Jan. 31 deadline applies are wheat, barley, oats, rye and soybeans. Corn is the only major grain for which the closing date is different. Arrangements for loans and purchase agreements on the 1956 corn crop must be completed on or before May 31st.


