Greetings! As we enter the homestretch of the 2023-2024 Lions Year, first and foremost I want to thank all the MD13 Lions for their service to humanity. Lions International has added a global cause of humanitarian service to include all those things we do that do not fit into the specific areas of childhood cancer, diabetes, sight, environment and hunger. MD13 leadership has done an excellent job of promoting service in all these areas. Disaster Relief, an area we have had to deal with more than we wish this year, and Youth are also designated as Global Causes now.

At the recent MD13 State Convention, we celebrated the outstanding job our multiple district leaders have done this year. The convention could have been marred by the poor service we experienced, especially in respect to food issues, but the fact that attendees practiced, not simply preached, the idea that "kindness matters" enabled us to celebrate the accomplishments of numerous Lions, especially our district governors. We also took advantage of the opportunity to update our knowledge of how our foundations work, to enjoy hospitality provided by our incoming second vice governors and OLERF, and generally to just have a good reunion with members of our Lions family. MDS Debbie Luttrell and PDG John Davis, with a little help from their friends, did a super job at what we believe is our last concession to COVID commitments.

If you like numbers, MD13 has completed almost 8000 service activities this year, serving close to 1.5 million people with 185,000 service hours donated. We have added 856 new members, and if we maintain this pace, we will meet the Constitutional Area Assigned goal of 957 new members. MD13 has 9700 members in 350 clubs at this point, and our clubs have donated over \$190,000 to various causes. Keep this last thought in mind; we have not had a year since 2007 in which we have had positive membership growth. We are hovering around the break even point so a strong June is critical. If each club added one member in the next month, we would end the 17-year losing streak in which we find our multiple district. Keep inviting non-Lions to join our association and keep encouraging non-participating Lions to come back to an active role in our clubs.

PDG Mike Kerek has been selected as the next Council Chairperson, DGe Brad King as the Vice Council Chair, and DGe Lilane Fox as the Chaplain. Congratulations to these Lions, along with DGe's Susan Davis, Patty Moorman, Mary Ellen Sherer, William Humphrey, and Toni Gray, who will take office in the new Lions Year, 2024-2025. I am confident that they will provide solid leadership and guidance given the support I have received this year.

It has been an exciting year for me, and I thank you all who have graciously welcomed me to club meetings and celebrations, to district events, and through personal interactions. You have followed the Code of Ethics reminder to be liberal in praise and careful in criticism, especially when criticism was due. Bless you all, MD13 pride of Lions.

PEACE POSTER Kits Are Available

OH1 Lions Clubs,

The LCI 2025 Peace Poster/Peace Essay kits are available. The OH1 District Youth Committee would like to help Lions clubs to participate in the 2025 Peace Poster Contest, "Peace Without Limits" by purchasing kits in bulk. Seventeen (17) OH1 clubs took advantage of our first bulk mailing offer. We are offering that option again, with a June 15, 2024 deadline. We will order shortly after that date.

The cost of Peace Posters is \$11.95 plus shipping (usually the shipping is \$17.95 per for a total of \$29.90 per kit). The Ohio Lions Youth Committee will pay the cost of shipping in bulk from LCI to a central location in Ohio – currently, my home. Each club would then pay the Peace Poster kit cost plus the cost of mailing the kit(s) to you. In our first order, that cost ranged from \$2.35 for one kit to \$6.10 for 4 kits. Most clubs paid \$14.30 for one kit including the mailing cost – quite a savings! Clubs will be invoiced for the purchases.

Leo Clubs & Cub Programs – Bringing in Youthful Volunteers

Need a new "spark" in your Lions Club? Consider a Leo Club or a Cub Program!

Is your Lions Club interested in learning more about Leo Clubs and the new Cub Programs? Please contact youth@ohiolions.org to schedule a speaker at one of your upcoming meetings.

Leo Clubs can be school-based or community-based. We have both types in Ohio. It normally takes 20 interested youth to form a club. Leos are ages 12-18 for Alpha Leo Clubs. If you create a school-based club, the advisor will more than likely be a school staff member. They can join the Lions Club as well and be the advisor of record with LCI or if they are not a Lion, a Lions Club member must serve as that liaison to the club and on the LCI records.

Lion Cubs are children up to age 12. Individuals in that age group can become a "Cub" in your Lions club. 5 cubs and you can create a Cub Club. There must be a Lion to help with this group. Everything we have seen from the Cub Clubs around the state shows that they are finding ways to serve their communities just like Lions and Leos.

There are so many ways that Lions can partner with youth members in the community. Please consider a Leo or Cub Club!

We are excited to hear that Bluffton Lions Club is working to start a new Leo Club there.


