Lions Where Have All the People Gone?

"Where Have All the People Gone?" is a 1974 American made for television science fiction drama film starring Peter Graves. In 1974 Ohio had approximately a little over 20,000 Lion members.

In 1918, the year Ohio joined LCI there were less than 1,000 members. By 1938 Ohio topped 3,000 members and over 4,000 members by 1940. In 1946 Ohio broke the 10,000 member mark. Ohio's membership grew in leaps and bounds in the fifties and sixties. It grew from 12,000 members in 1950 to 21,100 members in 1969, the year W.R.



"Dick" Bryan served as President of Lions International. The highest membership I was able to find was in 1972, 22,262 members.

At the turn of the century Ohio's members were at 17,499. For the next 20 years Ohio has seen a decline in membership yearly, except for the 2009-10 Lions year (an increase of 264 members). At the beginning of the 2020-21 Lions year Ohio had 10,690 members. At the writing of this article Ohio has 10,635, down by 55 members. Of course all clubs lose members due to deaths, but remember our population is increasing at a higher rate.

District OH1 has lost 4 clubs since July and looks to loose at least 1 more by the end of this Lions year. Fortunately, about 75% of those club members have transferred to other Lions clubs. As of right now OH1 is at 1554 down 9 for the year.

We can come up with hundreds of reasons for the decline. People are busier, people move more, there's other programs to join and this year Coda-19 virus. Since

the pandemic Lions and clubs have done the right thing, shutdown, wear masts and be aware of those around us for their health and safety along with our own.

I would like to think, and I'm pretty sure, Lions today are smarter and more creative than a hundred years ago. Many clubs have found ways to still serve their communities during this time. Some added members. Do you remember why you were asked and joined your club? I'm sure that has not changed.

Back to the original question "Where Have All the Lions Gone?" We have more former Lions than active Lions. Why did they leave? Do you think they would like to rejoin? I don't know, maybe we should ask them. After all, someone asked each of us once.

The XYZ Lions Club in Wood County has 25 dedicated Lion members. Every year the club holds their annual fish fry. Folks came from all over northwest Ohio for the two day festival. This is the club's biggest fundraiser and they donate more then half of its proceeds to the local community.


In the summer of 2008 the club had one of their biggest turnouts. Lion Chuck has been a member for more then fifteen years and always works at the festival. Lion Chuck is a big car buff, his prize possession is an original 1963 Mustang. Lion Sally is one of their newest members. This is Sally's second year at the fry. Lion Sally is a big Barbie doll collector. She still has her original Barbie and almost every special doll since.

Things were going along nicely until one of the fryer tables collapsed spilling the hot oil. A mother and her young son unfortunately were splattered by the hot oil and they needed several skin graphs.

The club did have liability insurance through LCI but was not incorporated. The family filed a lawsuit against the club and all of its members. For the next five years the lawsuit dragged on. Lion Chuck and Sally could lose their collections, Lion Joe wanted to retire and move south but could not sell his home because of the lawsuit.

If the club had spent \$99.00 to file to incorporate and \$25.00 every five years to renew it with the state of Ohio; the lawsuit could only have what the club owned not its members' property. I've heard Lions say that will never happen to us. Then I will ask why do you pay for car and house insurance every year for a ten to fifteen times higher price.

We all like to think positive but it's a very small cost to protect your members. Please contact your Zone Chair or District Officers if your club needs assistance filing.

Greetings OH1,

I am very impressed by the communities that encompass Region Two of OH1. I am sure part of the care for these communities is the result of Lion projects and contributions. That, in itself, is reason to make sure we as Lions don't sleep through this pandemic, but continue to search for ways to ensure our communities are safe and prosperous places to live. Supporting educational, environmental, and health-related issues by offering scholarships, participating in community clean-ups and undertaking



disease screenings are ways Lions have participated in community security and growth over the years. Most of these activities are still able to be undertaken despite Covid guidelines.

There are two areas in which we can certainly participate this month. One, we can make sure we file our compliance documents with the IRS and the Ohio Attorney General. This is a necessity for charitable organizations. Most of our clubs have until November 15 to file their compliance documents so let's get these administrative tasks done and out of the way. Statewide, we have set a goal for completing a service project the second week of October and reporting it on MyLlon. Reporting our service projects allows the Lions Clubs international to show organizations like the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation we are worthy partners in International projects, but reporting service also shows our communities we are active and worth joining in service. Again, if you need help with reporting in MYLlon PCC Darlene Roll has volunteered to walk you through the process. PDG Nick Schmunk published a list of over 100 service projects clubs might consider. It is certainly not exclusive. Look for the list in this newsletter if you haven't seen it yet. If and when you decide on a project, there is a commitment sheet to send to District Governor John Davis also in this newsletter.

I'm looking forward to get to all the clubs in Region Two, but Covidwise, I think those visitations will mostly come in the Spring. However, I would like to be invited to Zone meetings across our district, whether they are physical or virtual. If you need a speaker, I am also the Executive Director of the Ohio Lions Pediatric Cancer Foundation and can give you 10 minutes or more on what the Foundation is doing.

However, help will be given to any club to assist in developing or performing service. The service performed does not need to be a new project but must be service safely performed. Ohio Lions is hoping for 60% of clubs will participate District Governor John Davis is hoping for the same in the district.

It is hoped that by working together we will not only have a major impact on our local community, zone, region, District and State, but will become more visible to non-Lions looking for a way to serve in these challenging times. A sense of Lions working together will strengthen the Pride in all meanings of the word. There is not much time to plan and implement this project. Here a few questions We've been asked:

- 1. Do you have to do a 'new' service project? NO. Any service counts as long as a part of the service is performed during Service Week (Oct. 4-10)
- 2. Can clubs combine to do a service project? YES. The more the merrier. Clubs can work with other Lions clubs, other community groups, etc.
- 3. Is there a special reporting procedure? NO. Report this service as you would any other. Just make sure you report it.

- 5. Can we involve our Leos? YES. Leos have already expressed interest and will be working on this project as well.
- 6. Is there anything else we should do? YES. Take photos and publicize your work. We'll talk more about that later.

Zone Chairs are to contact club officers with information and to provide any assistance or assist in getting answers for them. There are two very important parts to this project the most important is a service to our communities. The second is to make sure your club officers report the activity to LCI in mylion. As always, should your club need assistants in filing please let us know-sooner than later.


A MESSAGE FROM YOUR DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR

In the upcoming newsletters I will share three levels of online reporting by the club secretary. Service Activities, PU101 and in this article Monthly Membership Reporting also known as MMR or WMMR.

The club secretary is a very important part of the Lions club. They are responsible for many tasks at the Club, District and International level.

One of your important tasks is to maintain an accurate club roster of members at MyLCI. This includes dropping members, adding new members and the Monthly Membership Reporting. MyLCI serves as your main resource to ensure that the club roster always has an accurate listing and that each member's contact information is kept current.

The Monthly Membership Report starts in July of 2020 and ends in June of 2021.



by the end of June 2021 all of the boxes shown in the picture above should be checked. Be sure to report every month even if there are no changes to the roster.

If you have never been to the district officer training the club secretary e-Book provides a fast and logical link to the information you need. Whether managing your club roster or ordering club supplies, the e-Book makes it easier to access the information, tools and resources you use most often to help you stay on top of your busy schedule.

Murray tries out eSight 4

Benjamin Bruce Murray, "The eSight Guy," is

hoping to upgrade a lot more than just technolo-Murray, of Melbern, is legally blind with op-

tic nerve atrophy, but his first set of eSight 2 glass-es in 2016 opened up the world of 20/20 vision and got him a job at Bryan's WBNO/WOCT radio station. Now he's moving to Bryan during a clinical trial for improved eSight 4 glasses and looking to become a city police and fire dispatcher.

"I love working at the radio station, especially during high school sports season, but I'm ready for a career change and being

a dispatcher has been a longtime goal," Murray said. "Moving to Bryan means I can be dressed and out the door when called upon, but my biggest celebratory thought is the mobility. Just having the freedom to walk around without wires is definitely a plus. And I can see facial expressions, which I've never been able to see before."

eSight glasses are a type of electronic eyewear combining cameras, algorithms and high resolution screens to maximize visual information and compensate for gaps in the user's field of view. Experts say without them, everything appears to be five miles away and unrecognizable but once they are on everything gets up close and personal like it is for everyone else.

"The glasses look like part of a PlayStation or a virtual reality game," Murray said. "When people ask me what I'm watching I get to say, 'You.' The technology keeps changing and eventually we'll get down to contact lenses, but the cost will also be a barrier ... \$4,000 dollars isn't just something you hand over."

Murray got his first set of glasses through community fundraisers and now, after clinical trials, he hopes the upgrades will enable him to return the fa-

"My hope is that with eSight 4 it gives the community, (first responders) and folks in general a sense of peace that I can do the job effectively and serve. I've already passed the civil service exam and background checks. If I have the ability to see I'd like to try.'

date he has raised \$2,577 through his own Facebook campaign (https:// www.facebook.com/donate/374925256822051/?fundraiser source=external url or on Venmo at BBM1989) and if he surpasses his goal, he plans to help others get similar glasses.

"I'm thrilled to try out the new tech," he said. "eSight is very aware of Williams County and northwest Ohio because of what we've done and the Lions Club has helped get eSight for two others here (one person in Montpelier and another in Edon. A third recipient lives in Wauseon). The community has always been there to help and I'm forever grateful."

This is an article that appeared in the Bryan Times newspaper 18 August 2020. Benjamin is a member of the Bryan Lions club, and is currently serving as Vice President. I thought this would be of interest to our club.

I hope all is well for each of you, and I will sure be pleased, when we awaken from this nightmare, and are able to live normal lives again.


